Forward

That the members of the LONGMIRE family have treasured feelings of pride and respect for their pioneer forbears, Hiram and Ann LONGMIRE, who came to South Australia in 1848, will be obvious to anyone who notes in the ensuing pages the number of times "Hiram", "Longmire" and "Whildon" (with variant spellings), have been used as names. Tracing the life and movements of Hiram 1814-1880, however, has taken much time and research, particularly as none of Hiram's personal possessions, such as documents, books, etc., seem to have survived. Therefore, I have endeavoured to note the principal sources for the information which I have gathered together about his life, in the notes on p. 7.

To those who have given or loaned the valuable old photographs and other material reproduced herein, supplied details of dates, names, etc., and helped in any other way, I express my sincere thanks. Lack of space prohibits including the names of many who have helped, but a few are the following:— the late Clarrie LONGMIRE (p. 10), who gave me encouragement and support in the early stages; Mrs. Millie NEVILLE (p. 24) and Mrs. Lil DAVEY (p. 21) who gave me liberal access to their fund of old photographs; Mrs. Jean McINTOSH (p. 34), who provided information which assisted in tracing the STUART family; and Mrs. Edie CHAPMAN (p. 25) who gave similar assistance for the family of Hiram 1838-1907 of Kybunga. Paramount among supporters has been Mrs. Greta HUNT (p. 38), who has supplied information, descendants' charts, and photographs for the Walter LONGMIRE branch in W.A.

There are many non-descendants who have assisted also. Among these are:- Mr. Francis LEESON, of the "Surname Archive", Sea Lane, Ferring, Sussex, who first obtained the birth certificate of Hiram, (p. 20), opening the way for further research in England; Mr. John McKEE, Hilltop House, Little Chalfont, Amersham, Bucks., who kindly sought out much of the information from the Public Record Office and Somerset House, London, and the parish churches in Nottinghamshire; Mrs. Rosemary ATTWOOD, 6 Hill View Road, Bournemouth, Hamps.; Mr. Brian KIPPING, 3 Boundary Road, West Bridgford, Nott., and Mr. Frank STRADLING, 10 Yoells Crescent, Lovedean, Portsmouth, Hamps., all of whom assisted similarly; Mrs. Mavis NANCARROW, 87 East Ave., Clarence Park, S.A., who graciously spent many hours searching old newspapers at the State Library for items of interest; and Mr. C. Bollen BLORE, 125 Midland Road, Wellingborough, Northants., who with Jack GREATOREX (p. 50), helped solve the GRATRICKS mystery.

From what I have been able to discover, it would seem that Hiram LONGMIRE's descendants are resident chiefly in South Australia, Western Australia, and New South Wales, with one family in New Zealand, and another in the U.S.A.

Where married the name of the descendant is shown above the black line, and the husband or wife beneath. I have tried to present an accurate and factual record current to January 8th 1972. Please excuse any errors which may have unintenionally been made. I can only hope that what is contained within these pages may be of interest and value now and in the years ahead.

Preamble

Whereas the surname LONGMIRE is not rare in England, research has proved that it is not common or widely dispersed. Henry HARRISON in "Surnames of the United Kingdom", (London, 1912) gives the following meaning for LONGMIRE:- "Dweller at the long marsh or bog". Mrs Daisy Frost MILNE (p. 10), after a visit to the U.K. first brought to my notice the book "A Westmorland Willage" by S. H. SCOTT, (published in 1904), which contains a pedigree of the LONGMIRE family. It states:- "With the BIRKETTS and the BROWNES, the various branches of the LONGMIRE clan have been the most numerous and Important families in Troutbeck. The many branches and ramifications of this family, with the exception of the LONGMIREs of Longmire, can all be traced to a common ancestry in the LONGMIREs of Longmire Yeat, in the reign of Henry VIII. The LONGMIREs of Longmire are descended from a John LONGMIRE living in 1571, and it is possible that the Longmire Yeat family are an offshoot of the same stock, but no evidence can be found to point to a common origin of the two families. The LONGMIRES of Longmire Yeat, Great House, Cragg, Limefit and Orrest are all descended from William LANGMYER of Longmire Yeat, who died in 1592."

The Archivist of the Record Office, The Castle, Carlisle, Cumberland, in a letter on 2nd July, 1971, states:- "You are quite right when you suppose that the family name LONGMIRE derives from South Westmorland. In fact the book by S. H. SCOTT to which you refer is about Troutbeck in Windermere.. The 18646" Ordnance Survey map marks two farms in the vicinity of Troutbeck, one called Longmire, and the other Low Longmire, which are possibly the farms from which your family originally derived. The other names, Cragg, Limelit and Orrest are either in Troutbeck or Windermere parishes, and are quite close to each other."

Truda and Tom AUSTEN (p. 38), during their trip, extracted information about the LONGMIRE family from "Some Records of Troutbeck," by George Henry JOYCE, published privately some time after September 1923:—
"The schoolhouse: In April 1637, George LONGMIRE, waller, was named in a memorandum as one of the three men asked to build most of the Troutbeck schoolhouse. In 1639, after the school had been built, a school foundation deed was drawn up. This deed mentioned that among others, William LONGMIRE, younger, was chosen by 'the greater number of the tenants and inhabitants of Troutbeck' as a 'gubernator' of the school. Likewise, James LONGMIRE was named a gubernator of the same school by the people 'above the Castle How in Applethwaite". The gubernators held office 'for their natural lives. Among the fifty or so signatories of the deed were:

William LONGMIRE, James LONGMIRE, George LONGMIRE, and (another) William LONGMIRE,"

Truda and Tom also copied the inscriptions from a number of gravestones in the Troutbeck churchyard, erected over the burial places of members of the LONGMIRE family who died during the 19th Century.

It would seem that very few LONGMIREs left Troutbeck and the Lakes District before the latter half of the 18th Century. A chart prepared from a check of all LONGMIRE births, marriages and deaths in the indexes at Somerset House, London, from the commencement of government registration in July 1837, until December 1851, shows that even as late as this, the great majority of LONGMIREs were still living in the North – in the counties of Westmorland, Cumberland, Durham and Lancashire.

A map of central England, showing Nollingham, Derby and Castle Danington.



With the onset of the Industrial Revolution, from c. 1760 onwards, some members of the LONGMIRE family must have moved southwards towards the Midlands, to seek employment. Probably among these was Benjamin LONGMIRE, a copy of whose marriage bond and allegation from the Lichfield Joint Record Office has been sent to me by John McKEE. Benjamin LONGMIRE, of Castle Donington, in the County of Leicester, (a few miles South West of Nottingham), tobacconist, aged 22 years, a bachelor, and Samuel BURROWS, of St Peter's Parish, Derby, framework knitter, entered a bond on 21st March 1772, so that Benjamin could marry Elizabeth PAGE of St Peter's Parish Derby, aged 25 years, a widow. William LONGMIRE, the father of Hiram (1814-1880), stated in the 1841 Census that he was not born in the county of Nottinghamshire. He was baptised at St Peter's, Derby on 22nd March 1772.

Hiram Longmire 1814-1880

On 1st August 1795, William LONGMIRE and Thomasin LANGWITH¹ were married in the Parish Church of St Mary the Virgin, Nottingham, England² The son born to them almost 19 years later was named Hiram³ although the entry for January 30 1814, in the baptismal register of the Parish of St Nicholas, Nottingham⁴ has a variant spelling of the name - Iram, and the mother's name spelt Tomesin. Their place of residence was stated to be in Granby Street, and William's occupation was entered as F. W. K. (framework knitter). Although there is a record of his brother, Henry, being apprenticed as a framesmith in 1824 at about 14 years of age, no record has been discovered of Hiram's early life.

In the Parish Church of St Peter's, Old Radford, Hiram and his wife, Ann, had a son, Henry, baptised on 3rd March 1836.⁶ Another son, Hiram, was born on 4th September 1838, and at registration of the birth on 13th September, Hiram stated his occupation as lacemaker, and the maiden



Entry in baptismal register of St. Nicholas Church for Hiram's baptism on 20th January 1814. name of his wife, Ann, as WHILDON? At the birth of their first daughter, Mary, on 21 March 1841, their address was given as Orchard Square, Radford,8 At the time of the first English Census in which names were recorded, as at midnight on the night of Sunday/Monday, 6/7th June 1841, Hiram. Ann and their three children were still residing in Orchard Square.9 The population of Nottingham had grown from 28,801 in 1801 to 52,614 in 1841.

William FELKIN 10 states, "In 1843 the prices of plain bobbin net were reduced to the lowest figure at which they had ever been sold, ... three fifths only of the lace frames were at work for 15 months," Hiram, with his family, travelled to Calais, France, where he was occupied in the lace trade. A daughter, Elizabeth was born on 2nd May, 1844 11 and a son, Walter, on 2nd April, 1846,12 both at St Pierre-les-Calais. About this time news may have reached Hiram of the ill-health of his mother. Tomazine LONGMIRE died at West Street. Parish of St Mary's, Nottingham, on 26th October 1846, aged 72 years, due to asthma and gradual decay.¹³ The situation in Nottingham was unimproved, as William FELKIN reports, "The commercial panic that supervened almost universally in 1848 produced severe losses in the Nottingham lace trade, as well as in the hosiery business of the midland districts... No regular sales of either hosiery or lace were made in the home markets from October 1847 to April 1848 and much distress was produced by hands being very partially employed. "14

It was probably in early November 1847, that Hiram decided to emigrate to South Australia with his family, and try his fortune in the young colony which had been proclaimed on 28th December 1836. They sailed aboard the "Hartley". a barkentine of 330 tons, which was built in Sunderland in 1836, and was owned by HOLDERNESS & Co. It departed from London, under the command of Captain B, SMITH, on January 2, 1848, and arrived back in London on October 30, 1848.¹⁵

After their arrival, the family settled at Dry Creek, 16 near Adelaide. While the family was becoming accustomed to their new environment, Hiram's father, William, died in Nottingham, of Bronchitis, at the age of 75 years, on 3rd September, 1848.17 A daughter, Annie, was born to Hiram and Ann at Dry Creek on 5th November, 1848.18 A son, who died aged 10 minutes was born to them on 13th August 1851,

and when the death was registered, 19 their place of residence was given as Ardtornish,20 Before the birth of their daughter, Emily, on 14th September 1952,21 they moved to Walkerville, closer to the city of Adelaide. Following the death of Emily, aged 15 months, on 20th January 1854,22 they moved to Riverton, approximately 55 miles North of Adelaide. Henry. the eldest son, was married at Riverton on 13th December 1857.23 and Mary, the eldest daughter, died there on 26th July 1858,24

With the growth of the copper mining centres of Moonta, Wallaroo and Kadina, on upper Yorke Peninsula, and the development of Clare, the 'Garden of the North', 50 miles to the East in a region of higher elevation and rainfall. Hiram realised the potential for the establishment of an inn or eating house near the salt lakes roughly half-way between the two districts.²⁵ The East-West track was intersected by a South-North track from Pt Wakefield to Crystal Brook via Nantawarra or South Hummocks. Although there was water from springs and wells for the travellers and their stock. what a contrast this bleak and desolate site must have been in comparison to the developed and crowded cities of Nottingham and Calais! The "Traveller's Home" Inn was built on the Hummock's Run, a leasehold and sheep run in the occupation of John ELLIS, covering an area of 251 square miles, for which, under pastoral lease number 124, ELLIS paid an annual rental of £125, 10, 0.26



The Inn was completed and Hiram became licencee, in about 1863. The newspaper announcement of the marriage of his daughter, Elizabeth, on 30th January 1864, stated ... "at the residence of the bride's father. 'Traveller's Home' Hotel. Hummocks." 27 (gazetted as Salt Lake, but better known as Lochiel). On May 11th of the following year, his wife. Ann, aged 53 years, died of Congestion of the Lungs, When the death was registered in Clare on 15th May, it was stated "17 years in the colony", and "husband an Eating House Keeper, "28 She was probably buried on ... "One of the islands at the northern end of the lake (which) was used as a burial ground. Local legend has it that thirteen people were buried there ... Usually, when there was a funeral, two chairs were carried out to the island. When the bearers became tired, the coffin was rested on the chairs so that it would not be in contact with the salt. The Salt Lake Cemetery nearby was dedicated in 1875. "29

"In the 1860's, the population in the older agricultural areas became greater than the land could sustain. Experiments were carried out to see if other areas could grow cereals and it was found that a large proportion of the land held by pastoral leases was capable of producing cereal crops. Liberal land laws were introduced, so that the government could resume such lands . . . In 1868-69, R.R. KNUCKEY and J.W. JONES made the original survey of the Hundred of Cameron." ³⁰ Longmire's Inn", where they most probably stayed, features clearly on the original survey maps of the Department of Lands Office, Adelaide, and it was widely known by this name for many years.

On 1st February 1869, Hiram LONGMIRE, aged 55 years, widower of Salt Lake, the son of William Longmire, was married to Caroline WARD, aged 34 years, widow of Salt Lake, the daughter of John BOWN. The service was performed in the Congregational Manse at Kadina, by William WILSON, in the presence of H. NANKERVIS, Innkeeper, Kadina, and H. WARD, blacksmith, Kadina. Their only child, Edwin Hiram, was born at the "Traveller's Home", on 27th October 1869, 32

For the Town of Lochiel, "A sale of allotments was held on 6/1/1870, but only one sale resulted, that being lots 11,15-19 to Frederick HANNAFORD, a landowner of Gumeracha, "Longmire's Inn", which the Longmire family held during the 1860's was not sold until six weeks later.

James WHITE of Kapunda bought it for £126. The government had paid Longmires £109, 17.0 for it, when the land was resumed. There was very little demand for allotments until the late 1870's, except in the case of a few at the northern end of Frances Terrace, which faces the lake. In 1880, the town consisted of the hotel, two houses, and a blacksmith shop owned by James BRENNAND, but the building of a general store had begun. "33

Sections 15 & 16 on the corner of Frances Terrace and Robert Street, Lochiel, near the Inn, were bought by Hiram LONGMIRE on 27th May 1870, 34 Whether he ever erected any building or dwelling on the land is unknown, but soon after this he removed to Kadina. In copies of the "South Australian Directory" 1873-1879, by his name is entered "chaff and corn dealer, Kadina, "35

He died of Bronchitis at his residence, Kadina, on 17th February 1880, aged 66 years, 36 and was buried in the Kadina Cemetery (block 76, path 6) on February 18th. Caroline remained a widow for a further 30 years, and died on 6th July 1910, aged 75 years. 38



Henry LONGMIRE, son of Hiram and Ann LONGMIRE, was baptised in St. Peter's Church, Old Radford, Nottingham, on 3rd March 1836, by the Rev. S. CRESWELL, Vicar of the Parish. He accompanied his parents to Calais, France, and to South Australia aboard the "Hartley" in 1848. His movements in South Australia are well described in the accompaning obituary from the "Northern Argus", While his parents were farming at Riverton, he married Ellen Martha FROST, aged 20 years, the daughter of John FROST. farmer of Gilles Plains, and Mary Ann (formerly KING). The ceremony was performed on 13th December 1857, witnesses being his sister, Mary LONGMIRE, and James HUGGINS, solicitor, of Kapunda. It was solemnised in the school room, and the entry made in the Anglican register, by the Rev. F.P. STRICKLAND, for the church had not yet been erected in this new settlement. The second names which they gave four of their children have been extremely helpful in tracing the earlier generations of the family.

In 1883 they moved to Collinsfield, where Henry leased section 26, Hundred of Redhill, from Mary, widow of Henry CAVENETT. On 24th February 1891, he leased for 10 years, section 460, Hundred of Mundoora, from John DARLING, wheat merchant. After his death on 27th May 1915, aged 79 years, he was interred in the Redhill Cemetery. Ellen Martha lived with her daughter, Mrs HEWETT, for many years, and died at Bews on 25th July, 1924, aged 86 years. She was buried beside her husband in the Redhill Cemetery, and a tombstone was erected to mark their last resting place.



1 Mary Frost Longmire

was born on 23rd June 1861 near Riverton, where her father was a teamster. She lived with her parents until the age of 40 years, when she married John McDONALD, farmer of Wokurna, on 9th October, 1901. 2 Walter Wilden Longmire




³ George Gratricks Longmire



was born on 3rd October 1868. On 2nd July 1890 she was married to Thomas Auburn FREEMAN, a farmer of Sharp's Well, the son of Joseph FREEMAN. The ceremony was performed in the Primitive Methodist Church, Collinsfield, and the witnesses were her father and David FREEMAN, farmer of Koolunga. They farmed for a time on section 115, Hundred of Wokurna, but in the early 1890s moved to section 218, Hundred of Koolunga (now farmed by their son, "Sam"). They were keenly interested in all matters affecting the welfare of the district. Her husband represented the Koolunga ward as councillorfor 6 years, and was chairman for 3 years. He died on 26th December 1929, while Bertha continued to live at Koolunga until her death on 2nd April 1940, due to cancer of the pancreas. She was buried beside her husband in the Koolunga Cemetery.



5 John King Longmire

was born on 6th May, 1870. At the residence of Mrs PLEW, Undalya, he married Alice FULLER, daughter of William FULLER of Yacka, on 2nd October 1893. The witnesses were John PLEW, farmer of Undalya and Ann FULLER of Yacka, Alice died at Clare on 4th February 1900 due to the failure of the heart while coming from under the effects of an anaesthetic. John established a butcher's business in Koolunga, and like his father became widely known for his knowledge of livestock. On 3rd March 1902 he married Emma Isabella WORK, postmistress, of Clare, the daughter of James WORK, in the house of Mrs WORK, Clare. The witnesses were Elizabeth WORK, librarian, Clare, and Margaret Mary WORK, postmistress, Koolunga. In 1922 they removed to Snowtown where he became a representative for the company of BAGOT, SHAKES & LEWIS, and developed into a renowned auctioneer. After the almagamation of the company with that of GOLDSBOROUGH MORT in 1926 he continued his work for the new management. He continued to live at Snowtown after his retirement, and died there on 25th March. 1956. Emma lived on at Snowtown for a further two years, dying on 2nd August 1958. She was buried beside her husband in the Condowie (Snowtown) Cemetery.

Lillian Maud Longmire

was born on 26th March 1878 at Blyth. At the house of her parents, Collinsfield, she married William Henry CAVENETT, son of Henry CAVENETT and Mary (formerly BROWN). The ceremony took place on 27th April 1898, in the presence of her brother, Henry Edwin LONGMIRE, and her husband's half-sister, Janet BELL. During the following years they lived on farms in the surrounding districts of Redhill, Wokurna and Ward's Hill, In March 1925 they moved to a farm of their own on section 493. Hundred of Tiparra, near Moonta, However, in 1929 the family moved back to the Pt. Broughton area, where the daughters married local farmers, while several of the sons moved further afield in the course of their employment. Lillian was widely known for her culinary skill and her bright, steadfast personality. After forty years of married life she died of cancer on 19th October 1938, William Henry also died of cancer, on December 19th 1940, and was buried beside his wife in the Pt Broughton Cemetery.

OBITUARY

Mrs. Ann Longmire, who died at her home, Dulwich avenue, Dulwich, on June 3, was in her 91st year. She was born at Alva, Scotland, in November, 1846, and came to Australia with her parents (Mr. and Mrs. Dawson), three sisters and one brother, in the ship Amazon at the age of nine. After a voyage of three months the Dawson family landed at Port Adelaide. They settled on Hummocks sheep-run. Married at 21 to the late Mr. Hiram Longmire, Mrs. Longmire lived at Kybunga, Blyth Plains, until March, 1918, when she retired to Dulwich. Of a family of ten children, eight survive There are 35 grandchildren and 35 great-grandchildren.

Hiram LONGMIRE, son of Hiram LONGMIRE, lacemaker, and Ann LONGMIRE formerly WHILDON, was born at Radford on 4th September 1838. He accompanied his parents to Calais, France, and to South Australia aboard the "Hartley" in 1848. His activities in Australia are clearly described in the accompanying obituary from the "Observer".

On 11th March 1868, at the private residence of the Rev. John GARDINER, he married Ann DAWSON (born 4th November 1846), daughter of George and Catherine DAWSON. The witnesses were his father, Hiram LONGMIRE, inn-keeper of Hummocks, and Priscilla RICHARDS of Adelaide.

In the period 1878-1881, he bought sections 70, 71, 423 and 425 in the Hundred of Clare, and between 1890-1894, sections 15, 16, 60, 65, 66, 70 to 74, 80, 81, 89 and part 69 in the Hundred of Blyth, and section 166 in the Hundred of Hall. His grandson, the late Mr. Wesley TILLER, informed me that it was the introduction of superphosphate into South Australian agriculture which was largely responsible for Hiram's increased prosperity.

He died on 20th June, 1907, and was laid to rest in the White Well (Kybunga) Cemetery. His widow remained a dignified, loved, if somewhat awe-inspiring matriarch to their many descendants for a further 30 years, until her death at the age of 90 years, in her home, Dulwich Avenue, Dulwich, on 3rd June 1937. Her remains were returned to Kybunga, and interred beside her husband's. A tombstone marks the grave.

Obituary

Mr. Hiram Longmire.

General regret was expressed at Blyth and Kybunga (report our local correspondents) when it was announced that Mr. Hiram Longmire had passed away at his residence, Clare, on June 20. He was one of the carliest settlers on Blyth Plains, where he reared a large family, several of whom are now cettled in the district. A few years ago, his health being somewhat precarious, he removed to Clare, so that he might be nearer his medical attendant. He frequently visited the farm at Kybunga, but a rather severe attack a few days ago terminated fatally on Thursday morning. Mr. Longmire, who was in

his sixty-ninth year at the time of his death, arrived in South Australia by the ship Hartley in 1848. He settled first at Gumeracha, and afterwards proceeded to the Victorian goldfields. Returning, he went into partnership with his brother, and was the first settler at Kybunga, below White's Well. He bought land at the first land sale at Blyth, and he and his sons were among the largest wheatgrowers in the district. He was one of the founders of the Kybunga Methodist Church, and trustee since its erection. He has left a widow, five sons, four daughters, and 13 grandchildren.


was born on 18th March 1869 at Kybunga. He helped his father on the farm and on 10th April 1895 he married Emma Jane TRESTRAIL in the Wesleyan Church, Penwortham, near Clare. Unfortunately she died on March 29th the following year, aged 24 years, and was buried in the White Well Cemetery. On 8th September 1898 Hiram married Edith Mabel MAY, daughter of Samuel MAY, at Mr. J. S. WALLIS'S house, Spring Farm, in the presence of Lilian MAY and Stanley TILLER. When his wife was expecting their third child, Hiram was accidentally killed by falling down a well while repairing a pipe, at his own farm, "Blair Athol", Kybunga, on 9th November 1901. He was buried beside Emma Jane in the White Well Cemetery.

was born on 10th May 1871 at Kybunga. At the Wesleyan Parsonage, Clare, she married Stanley Hall TILLER, son of William John TILLER, on 22nd July, 1896. The witnesses were W. TILLER, farmer, of Hoyleton, and Elizabeth SHAW, of Kybunga. After their marriage they farmed at Woodlands, later moving to "Almond Villa", Kybunga. From there they moved to "The Gums", Kybunga, until 1944, when they retired into Blyth township. They were both firm supporters of the Kybunga Methodist Church, and Stanley was a keen cricketer and lawn-bowls player. He died on 3rd November 1946, and Catherine on 2nd August 1951. 

was born on 8th December 1873 at Kybunga. At the Bible Christian Manse, Balaklava, he married Mary Read VEITCH, the daughter of William VEITCH, on 17th March 1898. The witnesses were William Henry LONGMIRE and Emily Hilda VEITCH. At first they lived near Blyth, from where they moved to Kybunga. After some time George took up land at Woodlands on his own. Later he let his farm and moved to Adelaide for the benefit of his children's education. In 1919 he moved back to Woodlands, and later went Balaklava. From there he moved to Lock, on Eyre Peninsula, to enable his sons to obtain land for farming. Finally he and his wife retired to Adelaide, and lived at Robert Street, West Croydon. Wherever they lived, George and his wife were involved in the worship and work of the Methodist Church, Mary died at Balaklava on 30th September 1950, and George died at Hindmarsh on 15th August 1963. They are buried in the Dudley Park Cemetery.

was born on 3rd December 1876 at Kybunga. Edith VEITCH of Watchman's Plains, daughter of Robert VEITCH, became his wife on 4th May 1904. The witnesses were his brother, Robert Maule LONGMIRE, and Ethel VEITCH, William Henry and Edith settled on their first property at Spring Gully, Kybunga. Later he bought from his brother, Malcolm. land adjoining the original "Homestead" property of their late father, the dwelling of which was known as "Alva House". He also had an interest in both the "Andamooka" and "Glen Lyon" pastoral companies, and a property at Lock on Eyre Peninsula. Through participation in these activities he became widely known as an excellent judge of stock. At Kybunga he was a trustee and officer of the Methodist Church and a member of the foundation committee of the Hall. For many years he was a councillor of the Blyth District Council. He died at the Wakefield Street Private Hospital, Adelaide, on 11th August 1951, and was buried in the Kybunga Cemetery. Edith died on 27th December 1967, at Clare, and was buried beside her husband.

5 Robert Maule Longmire

was born on 5th March 1879 at Kybunga. His early years were spent at Kybunga farming land near the original LONGMIRE holding. At the church of All Souls, St. Peters (Adelaide), he married Isobel Blanche BROWN, daughter of Edmond Clifte BROWN and Clara Blanche (formerly AYLIFFE), on 3rd July, 1907. He lived for a time at both Salisbury and Plympton, before moving to a Goolwa property where he built a new homestead. He held land in various parts of South Australia, later becoming managing-director of "Glen Lyon" Pastoral Company, living on the head station which was situated about 80 miles North East of Broken Hill.

Some years before his death he acquired land on the Younghusband Peninsula (the Coorong), which has since been sold to the Government as a National Park. He was always interested in cricket, joining the local club wherever he lived. At Langhorne's Creek and Copeville (Murray Mallee) he was responsible for the formation of new teams in those areas.

Isobel died on 17th January 1942, but due to a keen interest in the land, and good health, Robert was fortunate to be able to maintain a very active part in grazing pursuits until the time of his death at the age of 83 years, on 5th November 1962, following which he was buried in the North Road Cemetery, Nailsworth,



6 Malcolm Shaw Longmire

was born on 17th October 1881. At the Methodist Church, Clare, he was married to Ellen CREASY, daughter of William CREASY of Armagh near Clare, on 20th February 1907. The witnesses were Robert Maule LONGMIRE and Eva CREASY.

He farmed at Kybunga until 1912, when he sold his property and went to live in Adelaide. In 1913 he bought land near Loxton for farming. He later bought a large farming and grazing property at Kaniva in Victoria, as well as property on Eyre Peninsula, and another at Kadina. Soon after he went to Adelaide to live, he started dealing in sheep, and became one of the biggest sheep dealers in South Australia. His knowledge of sheep was renowned. In 1918 he purchased "Old Nipena" station, which he sold the same year. He was a director and part owner of the "Glen Lyon" and "Andamooka" Pastoral Companies.

Until he was 59 years of age he played cricket, a game in which he was intensely interested. He was one of the two men who helped launch the Country Cricket Carnival, and was on the original committee formed in 1927. It has now become a major event, with as many as 44 teams competing. He was also a keen baseball player, but cricket remained his great love.

He died on 21st January 1966, almost ten years after the death of Ellen, on 27th June 1956. They are both buried at the Centennial Park Cemetery.

was born on 23rd February 1884 at Kybunga. She married James Dean DALL, son of Joseph DALL and Elizabeth (formerly SCRIVEN) on 20th February 1908, at the Methodist Church, Kybunga. Soon afterwards they took up land at Tintinara in the South-East of the State, but later returned to Hilltown, 12 miles from Clare. Their three children were born at Clare, but the eldest died at the age of 18 months of what was later thought to be Pink disease. Some years later they moved to Woodlands, five miles S. W. of Kybunga, where they remained until 1953. Ann's failing health caused them to retire from the farm to Adelaide, to be near their daughter. Ann died on April 6th 1955, and James on 19th September 1959. They are buried in the Centennial Park Cemetery.



was born at Kybunga on 2nd June 1888. At the Methodist Church, Kybunga, she married Royden Frederick MAYFIELD, farmer, of Loxton, the son of Frederick George MAYFIELD and Hannah Selina Helen (formerly BEST), on 13th February 1911. They lived on their farm at Taplin in the Loxton district until 1919, when they moved into Loxton township. where they remained until 1926. They then moved to Adelaide for just over 12 months, after which they lived for a short time at "Watulunga", Finniss. Towards the end of 1928 the family moved to Kimba, Olive, Ivan and Lyall are still farming the property they purchased there. Royden and Mary later took up more land five miles West of Kimba on the Eyre Highway, which Hiram and Jeffrey have continued to farm.

Mary always took an active part in Church guild and choir work, and was one of the earliest members of Kimba branch of the Country Women's Association when it was formed in 1931. She had an extremely bright and happy disposition, but suffered for many years with chronic bronchitis. After her death on 3rd August 1960, she was buried at Kimba. 

Extract from the birth's register for the township of St. Pierre-le-Calais, 1844.

Elizabeth LONGMIRE (legitimate) No. 121.

1844, 3rd May, 9 o'clock in the morning. I, Louis Jospeh FOUGERE, deputy mayor, acting as registrar for the Mayor at St. Pierre-les-Calais, Calais district, Pas-des-Calais area, welcomed Mr. Hiram LONGMIRE, aged 30, textile worker, of Saint Pierre-les-Calais, who presented me a female child, born at home 'rue des quatre coins' - 4 corners st., Fr. section, No. 72, on 2nd May, at 3 o'clock in the morning. Mr. LONGMIRE declared that the child was born to him and to Ann WILDON, his spouse, aged 33, and that it should be named Elizabeth. This declaration was done in front of Mr. John DAYKIN, aged 36, textile worker, and Henry BUTLER, aged 36, greengrocer, both of Saint-Pierre-les-Calais. The father and witnesses as well as myself have signed the present certificate after it had been read aloud.

Translation of the birth registration.

The details of Elizabeth's birth in Calais, France, on 2nd May 1844 are shown in the accompanying translation from her birth certificate. She accompanied her parents to South Australia on the "Hartley" in 1848. She was married to Hector STEWART, son of Donald STEWART, at the "Traveller's Home", Hummocks, on 30th January 1864.

Hector and Elizabeth lived for some time at Watervale, near Clare, where they had an orchard of apricot trees. Misfortune prevented the success of this venture, and Hector was employed by his brother-in-law, Walter LONGMIRE, and by farmers in the district. About 1890 the family moved to a house in Cornish Street, Wallaroo, for which the council valuator's assessment notice dated November 19th 1892, still exists among leaflets in the Family Bible in possession of their grand-daughter, Mrs. Jean McINTOSH. A small note dated November 2nd 1894 states:- "Dear Mrs. Stewart, accept this small present as a token of love and respect I have for you. Wishing you every prosperity wherever you may go is the wish of your friend, E. A. QUICK."

From Wallaroo they moved to a house at 10 Kermode Street, North Adelaide, although Hector still found employment in the country. It was about this time that the family gradually changed the spelling of the name to STUART. During the course of his work Hector lost an eye when a sheep kicked the shears into it, and an arm was amputated after it became infected. When Elizabeth died, the following notice appeared in the "Chronicle" of August 10th, 1907:-"STUART. On August 5th at Cupper St., Kent Town, Elizabeth Fox STUART, dearly loved wife of Hector STUART. Aged 63 years. 'Oh so weary.'"

The additional name "Fox" was also used at the birth registration of her son, Leslie Hiram Longmire STUART, and may be a clue to the maiden surname of one of her forbears. After Elizabeth died, Hector went to live with his daughter, Flora LOW, at Kensington. He died on 12th August 1921, aged 85 years, and was buried near his wife in the Dudley Park Cemetery.

Mabel was always interested in Churchwork and Girl Guides, being constantly engaged in sewing and the preparation of sweets and cakes for fairs, fetes and stalls. 

Walter LONGMIRE, son of Hiram LONGMIRE, textile worker, and Ann LONGMIRE, formerly WILDON, was born at Calais, France, on 2nd April 1846, as shown in the translation of his birth certificate on page 40. In 1848 he departed for South Australia with his parents aboard the "Hartley", and moved with them to Dry Creek, Ardtornish near Modbury, Walkerville, Riverton and Hummocks. At the age of 29, while living at Blyth Plains, he was married to Margaret DAWSON, 23, daughter of George and Catherine DAWSON. The ceremony was performed on 30th March, 1876 at the Presbyterian Church, Clare.

The family moved north to the Jamestown area, where they were living at the time of the birth of their son, Henry, in 1888. In this year Walter was an original shareholder of the S.A. Farmer's Co-operative Union (now known as Southern Farmers), as stated on page 195 of Nancy

ROBINSON'S book "Change on Change", a History of the Northern Highlands of South Australia, 1971. On 12th March 1890, Walter purchased sections 123, 124, 148 and 149 in the Hundred of Parnaroo, totalling 1,782 acres. The family moved to their new property to the North East of Jamestown, in what proved to be a drier area, suited more to grazing and pastoral pursuits than to farming. It was here that their son, George, died on 3rd June 1894. The land was transferred to William NEIL, of near Oodlawirra, on 7th May, 1896.

Soon afterwards they left South Australia for the Carrolup district of Western Australia. Walter's life there is described in the accompanying obituary, kindly communicated to me by his son-in-law, the late Mr. Ernest HAGGERTY, on 23rd August, 1967. Walter passed away on 24th January 1926, at his home, Carew Street, Katanning, at the age of 79 years, and was buried in the Katanning Cemetery.

Walter's widow, Margaret, continued to live in their home, 'Glen Garry", Carew Street, Katanning, until her death in 1945, when the following obituary appeared:- "The death occurred in the Katanning Hospital on Sunday, January 14, of Mrs. Margaret LONGMIRE, relict of the late Walter LONGMIRE, at the age of 92 years. Deceased came with her husband and family to Katanning from South Australia in 1898, commencing farming in the Carrolup district on a property they named "The Glen", now farmed by their son, Jack..."

Obituary

Although it has been known for some time past that the weight of years was telling on Mr. Walter Longmire, senior, his sudden death on Sunday must have come as a shock to his many friends and relatives in these districts. Following their usual custom, Mr. and Mrs. Longmire attended the Presbyterian Church on Sunday morning, Mr. Longmire being then, apparently, in his usual health. After the service, however, Mr. Longmire was overcome with fainlness. and had to be assisted to his home by the Rev. J. L. Smith, and medical aid was sought. This was forthcoming immediately, but the patient was by this time practically unconscious, death taking place shortly after 1 o'clock, from heart failure. Deceased was within two months of his eightieth birthday, and was an early settler in the Katanning district, having arrived from South Australia some 30 years ago with his wife and children (four sons and two daughters), all of whom survive him.

Mr. Longmire was a farmer, born and bred, and had spenthis life in farming pursuits before coming to this State. Like many another South Australian, bad seasons drove him to find new fields for his energies, and the reports of agricultural lands being developed in this State turned his attention to the West. Arriving at Katanning, he took up land at Carrolup, where, with his family, he settled upon and developed that fine property, "The Glen", which he passed over to his youngest son, John, some seven years ago, when he retired from active life to spend the balance of his days quietly in Katanning. During those years, he embarked each of his three elder sons, Malcolm, Walter and Stewart, on good properties of their own in the Rockwell and Badgebup districts, east of Katanning, whilst his daughters both married farmers, one being now Mrs. Walter Haggerty, at Muradup, and the other, Mrs. F.J. Stott, at Datatine.

During his long sojourn in the district, Mr. Longmire was an ardent supporter of the Presbyterian Church, for 25 years having been on the Board of Management, whilst his efforts were responsible, chiefly, for the erection of the church at Carrolup. For a while he was a member of the Katanning Road Board, and in other directions evinced his public spiritedness.

The funeral took place on Monday afternoon, at the Katanning Cemetery, and was very largely attended by friends from far and near, Rev. J. L. Smith conducting the service both in the Presbyterian Church and at the graveside. Pallbearers were Messrs. Washington, Jos. Ladyman, Gilbert, Barkley, F. M. Gare, and J. Robertson, whilst all members of the family were present.

1 Malcolm Hiram Longmire

was born on 25th January 1877 at Clare, South Australia. He sailed with his parents from Pt. Adelaide to Albany, W.A., in 1898. They travelled by waggon and teams to select farming land at Carrolup, eleven miles west of Katanning, and over 100 miles from Albany. In 1903 Malcolm, with his brothers Walter and Stewart, selected land East of Katanning, where they helped pioneer the district, Malcolm married Amalia Augusta ("Mollie") FLUGGE on April 11th, 1906, at Rockwell, East Katanning, Mollie was one of a large pioneering family who had also come from S.A. in the Together they cleared and worked their late 1800's. property, 'Riverside'! Malcolm was a keen cricket player. and enjoyed tennis, golf and shooting. During his bachelor days he rode many miles by bicycle to play chess. He was interested in district affairs, and active in Primary Producers Associations, "Riverside" was sold in 1944, as they had no sons to farm it. At a farewell social for them organised by the residents of the Rockwell and Badgebup district, prior to their retirement to Katanning, Mollie collapsed and died. Malcolm lived alone in Katanning until his death on 15th September 1946, after which he was buried near his wife and infant son, Hiram, in the Katanning Cemetery.



Annie LONGMIRE was born on 5th November 1848, at Dry Creek, near Adelaide, and the birth was registered on 13th December. At the Congregational Manse, Kadina, she was married to William RICHARDS, 20, of Salt Lake, the son of Wm. C. B. RICHARDS, on 15th November, 1867, and for a time they lived near Lochiel. A Decree Nisi of Dissolution of Marriage was granted on 19th November 1874. The decree was granted in favour of Anne RICHARDS, the petitioner, on the grounds of the adultery and dessertion of William Charles Bennett RICHARDS without reasonable excuse. The marriage was dissolved by Order Absolute dated 23rd December 1875.

On 15th February 1877, Annie married William Henry HAGGERTY, teamster, of Armagh, near Clare, the son of Daniel HAGGERTY. The ceremony took place in the Bible Christian Manse, Auburn. With this man she found the happiness she deserved. After the birth of their children they moved to Western Australia, where they farmed in the Kojonup district. Annie HAGGERTY died at Kojonup on 31st December 1934, and her husband on 24th September 1941, aged 85 years. They are buried in the Kojonup Cemetery.

Edwin Hiram LONGMIRE was born on 27th October 1869, at the "Traveller's Home", Hummocks, the only child of Hiram's 2nd marriage to Caroline WARD nee BOWN. When his parents moved to Kadina, he accompanied them. On 10th June 1891, he married Mary Emma PHILLIPS, the daughter of George PHILLIPS (of the "Fruit Exchange", Taylor Street, Kadina) at the Welsh Manse, Wallaroo. Until 1918 they lived in Kadina, where Edwin was a house painter and decorator. After his removal to Adelaide he continued this business for many years. They were vigorous supporters of the Methodist Church, and were held in high esteem by a wide circle of friends. Mary Emma died on 28th September 1930 at Maylands, aged 63, and Edwin on 12th November 1943 at St. Peter's.

was born on 12th December 1896 at Kadina. She attended the Kadina Public School after which she stayed at home helping her parents until her marriage to John Harold Frederick SMITH, a miner of Kadina, son of John SMITH. The ceremony was performed in the Wesleyan Manse, Wallaroo Mines, on 31st January 1914. When the copper mines closed in 1917 they removed to Adelaide where her husband became a sawyer at COWELL Bros., timber merchants. They later moved to Whvalla, where her husband became a foreman in the B. H. P. timber mills. After 19 years there they retired to Kadina for 16 years. Throughout these years Annie and her husband were staunch supporters of the Methodist Church, although as there was no Methodist Church in Whyalla in the early days, they attended the Presbyterian Church. Annie played the organ, sang in the choir, and taught in the Sunday School, of which her husband was Superintendent. Finally they removed to Aldersgate Senior Citizen's Village, Adelaide, where Fred died on 9th September 1970.

When his father moved to Adelaide buying, decorating and selling houses, he joined him there and went into business with him, carrying on the business on his own after his father retired. On May 11th 1922 he was married to Violet Annie GATES, daughter of Thomas GATES, in the Christian Church, George Street, Stepney. Following the birth of their son, his wife died on 5th May, 1923. Violet Rachel GOURLAY, the daughter of Arthur Charles GOURLAY, became his wife on 29th January 1925, in the Stepney Christian Church, where he has been a deacon for many years. During his younger days he was an enthusiastic tennis player. He has resided at 47 Canterbury Avenue, Trinity Gardens, for many years.

Longmires & Lace

Machine-made lace is such a familiar product today, that probably few people ever consider the difficulties which accompanied the development of the complex machinery invented to manufacture it in the early years of the 19th Century. "Lace was first made by machinery in the 18th century, and it was by modification of the stocking frame between 1760 and 1800 that a lace mesh by mechanised mean was first produced. It was John HEATH-COAT from Long Whatton, near Loughborough, (Leicestershire), who in 1808-09 invented the net machine. In 1813 John LEAVERS, also from the midlands, using the same principle, designed a machine which could make patterned lace." (Guy DENNISON, "This is your Nottingham".)

There was intense competition to invent improvements, and frequent litigation in connection with patents. FELKIN (see note 10, p. 7) states on page 225:- "The defendant Benjamin MOORE's machine was constructed in conjunction with LONGMIRE and NOBLE in 1812, at New Radford," The case was decided in favour of MOORE.

William and Thomasin LONGMIRE had other children born between their marriage in 1795, and the birth of Hiram in 1814.

A Edwin LONGMIRE, lacemaker, of Hyson Green, is listed in the poll book of 1826. At the time of the 1841 Census Edwin LONGMIRE, 45, lacemaker, and his wife, Isabella, were living at liigh Cross Street, St. Mary's, Nottingham, but Edwin died in the June quarter of 1844, and Isabella remarried to an Alfred CARTER in the September quarter of 1845.

B Mary LONGMIRE, 35, was with (her mother?) 'Thormaszin' LONGMIRE, in Broad Street, St Mary's, Nottingham, for the 1841 Census, A Mary LONGMIRE was a shopkeeper at Lister Gate according to the 1853 Directory, but it is not known If she was a spinster, or one of the widows, Mary, C William LONGMIRE, lace manufacturer, and his wife. Mary, formerly CLARKE, of 1 Clarence Street. St Mary's, Nottingham, had a daughter, Elizabeth, born on 1st May, 1845. William died In the June quarter of 1850, aged 42. Mary LONGMIRE, widow, aged 44, lived in Paradise Place, Queen's Road, St Mary's, Nottingham, at the time of the 1851 Census, with her children Mury Ann, 23; George, 17; Frederick, 13; William, 8; and Elizabeth, 5.

D Henry LONGMIRE, aged about 14, son of William LONGMIRE, lacemaker of Nottingham, was apprenticed as a framesmith in 1824. He was living at East Street, St Mary's, Nottingham, at the time of the 1841 Census, with his wife, Mary, 30, and children William, 8; Ann, 6; Henry, 4; Albert, 2; and Edwin, 4. An entry in WHITE's Directory in 1844 mentions that Henry LONGMIRE, bobbin net manufacturer, lived at Mansfield Road, Nottingham. Mary, a widow, was living with her children, William, 18; Anne, 16; Henry, 14; Albert, 12; Frederick A., 8; Mary, 6; and Eliza, 3, at Kippis Street, during the time of the 1851 Census. Edwin, aged 10, was a visitor with Charles and Mary WRIGHT, of Sherwood Street.

E Tomeson, daughter of William and Tomeson LONGMIRE, was baptised on March 17th 1811, at St Nicholas, Nottingham. She was apparently the only other child of William and Thomasin baptised at St Nicholas, for Brian KIPPING checked the registers from 1796-1830.

The LONGMIRE family in Nottingham was affected by the prevailing economic conditions. which Patricia WARDLE describes in "Victorian Lace. " (London, 1968), "Sharp fluctuations of fortune were indeed to bedevil the machine-made lace industry right through the nineteenth century. Like the hand-lace industries, and porhaps even more than them, machine lace was subject to the vagaries of fashion. Novelty was the goal endlossly pursued. As soon as some new laco caught the public fancy, as many firms as possible, both large and small, rushed into production, with the inevitable result that the market was flooded, demand slackened, and stocks could not be got rid of. This pattern of events occurred time and time again, but it only hindered, and did not halt the steady growth of the Nottingham lace trade throughout the nineleenth century. 1837 was a particularly bad year for the industry, as only half the available machines were able to be kept in production. " (pp. 225, 226).


Furthermore, FELKIN comments on page xxxii:- "The average wage of a hobbin-net hand in 1836-? was 15sh 1d per week. 'When but a mere child,' wrote William BOOTH, (founder of the Salvation Army), of his life in Nottingham during the 1830s and 1840s, 'the degradation and helpless misery of the poor stockingers of my native town, wandering gaunt and hunger-stricken through the streets, droning out their melancholy ditties, crowding the Union, or toiling like galley slaves on relief work for a subsistence, kindled in my heart yearnings to help the poor which has continued to this day and which have had a powerful influence on my whole life!."

As a legend had survived that the LONGMIRE family had lived in France before coming to South Australia, and the births of Elizabeth and Walter could not be found in England, I sought to discover their place of birth in France. My efforts were hampered by the language barrier and the fact that there was no central index to civil registrations in France. Disappointment at negative replies from the lace-making centres of Lyon, Alencon and Lille, changed to optimism when I read that "It is Calais only that can be said to have become the Nottingham of France" (p. 408, FELKIN), and to joy with the return of the birth certificates from Pas-de-Calais Archives.

Hiram did not find prosperity in the lace industry in Calais, however, as "wages fell with prices, and for some time English workmen returned from Calais, where still the hands were more than half English." (p. 413, FELKIN.)

'In 1846 (in Nottingham) a public meeting was held of 2,000 lace hands, half of whom were partially employed, the other whom were altogether out of work. They prayed the House of Commons to restrict the working time to 16 hours and two shifts a day. This petition was signed by 430 small machine owners: 27 of the large owners petitioned against it, and the bill was negatived by about 130 to 50." lp. 378, FELKIN).

It is not surprising that Hiram decided to abandon the lace industry for ever, and to venture to South Australia. Long may his numerous descendants acclaim him!



"An example of an early traverse warp machine lace, needle run. Known as Freeman's Lace, this example was made between 1830 and 1850 at Nottingham. It is of a type known to be made in that period by a Nottingham firm called MOORE, LONGMRE, and NOBLE, but there is no firm evidence that this piece was in fact produced by that company. They settled on the Hummocks Sheep Run, (see pages 5 and 19).

Catherine DAWSON of Armagh, near Clare, died on May 8th, 1879, aged 69.

George DAWSON, shepherd, of Condowie, near Snowtown, died on October 16th, 1891, aged 88.

A William is remembered in his later life for his custom of wearing the kilt, and for hailing trams in Adelaide by standing in front of them and raising his walking stick!

B Elizabeth married Malcolm SHAW. She was widowed early, without children, and supported herself by keeping cows and goats. She spent many years with her sister, Ann, and was affectionately known as "Aunty Shaw". Her health remained stronger than Ann's, and her habit of thrusting a dish in front of her punctually each evening, regardless of company, and saying "Teeth, Ann," is recalled with humour and love. She read the Bible assiduously, knitted industriously, and was a fine example of Scottish thriftiness. Skirts remained full length, despite the vagaries of fashion, and she and Ann "Dinna look" at the exposed limbs visible in the bathing costumes of the 1930's. She died on 26th January 1941.

C Ammarried Hiram LONGMIRE on 11th March 1868 (see page 19).

D Catherine married John FERGUSON on 1st January 1869, and had a family of four sons and three daughters. During her widowhood she lived next door to her sisters, Ann & Elizabeth, in Dulwich Avenue, Dulwich. She died on 30th October 1930.

E Margaret married Walter LONGMIRE on 30th March 1876 (see page 36).

J Charles (and Priscilla) FROST, son (and daughter) of John and Mary Ann FROST, were baptised at Steeple Bumpstead on 22nd September 1840. It is probable that they were twins, and that Charles died before the 1841 Census.

A Mr. and Mrs. FROST are recorded in the State Archives as having arrived in South Australia on June 18, 1844, from London, aboard the "Taglioni".

K Emily Hannah FROST, daughter of John FROST, farmer, and Mary Ann, formerly KING, was born on 26th August, 1844, and the birth was registered by Mary Ann, of Light Square, on September 19th. Emily was their only child born in South Australia.

John FROST died near Melbourne on 29th March 1852. The newspaper announcement of his death reports his age incorrectly.



"I may mention by the way, that Mr. FROST claims, and I believe, justly, to have discovered more mines than any other individual in the colony. He is an excellent bushman, is capable of enduring great fatigue and considerable physical exertion, and is moreover a perfect enthusiast in mining matters." (page 52) He is also mentioned in Hans MINCHAM's "The Story of the Flinders Ranges"*, and Robert BRUCE's "Reminiscences of an old Squatter"*. From p.4, "The Chronicle", Nov. 1, 1884:--

FROST.—On the 22nd September; at Dalhousie Springs, Alired Frost, carrier, while on route to Qwen Springs with stores.

D "Joseph FROST died at Clare on March 26th 1897" + - entry in Ellen Martha and Henry LONGMIRE's Bible.

E Benjamin was also involved in mining ventures in the North of the state. It is believed that he and his two elder brothers did not marry.

F Eliza Hannah: "WALLIS-FROST. On 20th June 1864, by licence by Rev. Samuel GREEN at Rosslin, Glenorchy (near Melrose) Thomas Albert WALLIS to Eliza Hannah, eldest daughter of the late Mr. John FROST of Gilles Plains." From p. 31, "The Chronicle", Jan. 19, 1907:-

WALLIS.—On the 11th January, at her residence, "Enri's Coine," 20, Wright-street, Eliza Hannah, the beloved wife of Thomas Albert Wallie, of Arltungo, Alice Springs, aged 68 years,

G Ellen Martha was baptised on 11th November 1836 at Sieeple Bumpstead, Essex +. She married Henry LONGMIRE at Riverton, S.A., on 13th December 1857. (see page 8).

H John King's birth in the Risbridge Registration District is indexed in the June quarter of 1838 at Somerset House. While an overseer at Caroona station he married Margaret COLE (formerly, GORDON), widow, in the Bible Christian Manse, Pt. Augusta, on 8th March 1876. He died on September 2nd 1917, following which an obituary was printed on page 12 of the "Chronicle" of September 15th. - "Another of Franklin Harbor's pioneers. Mr. John King FROST, died at the Cowell Hospital during the week, . . Born in England he came to Australia with his parents when very young. After serving on the estates of the late Mr. George Fife ANGAS (who was a relative), Messrs. MORPHETT and DAVENPORT, he selected land at Yabmana, where he has resided ever since 1879. Note: George Fife ANGAS (see his biography by Edwin HODDER*) was born at Newcastle on Tyne on May 1st 1789, and married Rosetta FRENCH of Hutton, Essex, at Hutton on April 12th 1812. He was instrumental in the formation of the South Australian Company, which bought a big holding of land in the colony; and took a deep and personal interest in South Australia, becoming an energetic supporter of it in a number of ways, such as in religious matters, the welfare of Aborigines, the emigration of German settlers, banking, education and land development. I believe the relationship mentioned in H. was to Rosetta, who died at "Lindsay Park", Angaston, S. A., on January 11th 1867, aged 74. George Fife ANGAS died at "Lindsay Park" on May 15th 1879. They had a family of three sons and four daughters. One of their sons was George French ANGAS, the artist,

From the time I first learnt the four family names (Mary Frost, Walter Wilden, George Gratricks and John King) which Henry and Ellen Martha LONGMIRE (p. 8) gave their children, I was intent upon discovering their origin. Gradually my research produced the evidence, until finally I was left with "Gratricks". Continual enquiry proved fruitless, until I saw the name and address of Jack GREATOREX of 1098 Orchard Road, Mississauga, Ontario, Canada, as a new member of the Society of Genealogists, London. I wrote him, explaining the possibilities, and to my pleasure, received a photo-copy of the following part of the Rev. Samuel HAYMAN's article "Notes on the Family of GREATRAKES" from vol. IV of JEWITT's "Reliquary" * :-

WEST HALLAM

(A parish $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Derby.)

This branch of the Family, in my judgment, proceeded from that settled in Derby. From the private collections of Sir Ralph Bigland, Garter*. I derive the following descents. They were drawn up by Garter, in the year 1780,

THE REV. HENRY GREATOREX, of West Hallam: married Elizabeth, daughter of ---- by whom.

JOHN.

He lies buried at West Hallam. His son,

THE REV. JOHN GREATOREX, was Rector of West Hallam. He married Priscilla, daughter of John Lowe," of Derby, Esq.; and by her, who was buried at Derby, in 1765, actate 81, he had a son,

THE REV. JOHN DANIEL GREATOREX, of Merry Bower, co. Derby. He married Anne. daughter of Nicholas Bright! of Chesterfield: and by her (who was living at Chesterfield, in 1779) he had issue.

- Henry G., of London, born at Great Dolben, co. Leicester: unmarried in 1780.
- I. Priscilla, who was married to George King? of Haverill, co. Suffolk. Both living in 1780, and had a son, George Greatorex King, born in January, 1780.
- H. Elizabeth, who was married to Edward Lewington, of Sharpenhoe, co. Bedford,

He died in 1758, aetate 38, and was buried at West Hallam.

Since then I have found that the descent is incorrect in that it gives the name of the Rev. Henry's son as John, when it should be Daniel, as illustrated in these entries from VENN's "Alumni Cantabrigiensis 11 * :-

GREATOREX, HENRY, Adm. pens. at Emmanuel, Jan, 25, 1658-9. Of Derbyshire, Matric, 1659; B. A. 1662-3. R. of West Hallam, Derbs., 1668-1716. Died 1716.

GREATOREX, DANIEL, Adm., sizar (age 17) at Emmanuel. June 21, 1703. Of Derbyshire, Matric, 1704; B. A. 1706-7; M. A. 1711, Ord. priest (Elv) Mar. 5, 1709-10. R, of West Hallam, Derbs. 1716-24. Died 1724. Father of John (1736).

GREATOREX, JOHN. Adm. pens. (age 19) at St. John's, May 1, 1736. S, of Daniel (1703), clerk, of Derbyshire, B. at West Hallam, School, Chesterfield (Mr Burrows), Matric, 1736; B. George KING, 25, farmer of Haverhill and Priscilla GREATOREX, 28, of Sharpenhoe in the parish of Streatly (where her sister, Elizabeth, lived) were married on October 23, 1778, by licence dated October 22. +

Those wishing to trace the ancestry of the BRIGHT family are advised to commence with a study of page 353 + of J. HUNTER's "Hallamshire", which shows Anne GREATOREX's descent from John BRIGHT, who was seated at Banner Cross in the reign of Elizabeth I. The Central Library. Sheffield, has the deed of settlement, dated October 13, 1717, made prior to the marriage of Nicholas BRIGHT and Mary WATKINSON, written on two vellums 30" x 24". Mr. F. E. G. BAGSHAWE, of Snitterton Hall, Derbyshire, has a portrait in oils of Anne's grandfather, John BRIGHT, Mayor of Chesterfield, and High Sheriff of the County of Derby in 1722.

Priscilla LOWE is included in DRURY-LOWE of Locko Park (BURKE's "Landed Gentry" *), which gives descent from Thomas LOWE, died 10 Jan. 1415. Her paternal grandmother was Catherine, daughter of Sir Arthur PILKINGTON, 1st Baronet. of Stanley, Yorks, (BURKE's "Peerage" *. MILBORNE - SWINNERTON - PILKINGTON), and paternal great-grandmother was Anne, natural s inry¹s Ilusumui

Further information about her ancestry may be gained by the use of "The Genealogist's Guide" of 1903 * by G. W. MARSHALL, BURKE's books previously mentioned, "The Genealogist" * (1877-1922), the "Reliquary," * etc.

On the wall of the north aisle of the church at West Hallam there is a small brass plaque on which is engraved:-

Lye the Bodyes of
Eliz* & Hen* Greatorex.

It is surmounted by an augel, and accompanied by a skull and cross bones. There is also an ornately sculpted alabaster plaque to the memory of Elizabeth, who died on April 7th 1697, aged 51.

Appendix B

The Stewart/Stuart Family

Hector Donald STEWART was born on 27th September 1838, according to the entry in the Family Bible, now in the possession of his grandlaughter, Jean McINTOSH. The Register of Emigrant Labourers who applied for a Free Pasunge to South Australia 1838-1840 (C.O. 386/150) at the Public Record Office, Chancery Lane, London (and Joint Copy Microfilm No. 875, State Archives of S. A.), contains the following entry:-5519, July 22nd 1839, Donald STEWART, agricultural labourer, of Hulend, Isle of Eigg (Invernessshire, Scotland, 5m. Longmire Ancestry

On 12th February 1692, <u>George LONGMIRE</u>, son of <u>William LONGMIRE</u> late of Kendal, Westmorland, married Ann BRAITHWAITE. By 1697 they were living at Hawkshead, Lanc. on the other side of Lake Windermere, and were members of the Swarthmore Meeting of the Society of Friends (Quakers).

George and Ann LONGMIRE had a son <u>William LONGMIRE</u> born on 23rd Dec. 1701 in Hawkshead. A little less than eleven years later George died at Hawkshead on 7th Aug. 1712. Ann lived on for many more years, but apparently returned to Kendal for her burial is recorded there on 3rd Jan. 1755.

Meanwhile her son William LONGMIRE had married on 22nd Dec. 1743 at Leeds, Yorkshire, Anna ENGLISH, a widow. She was born on 14th April 1707, the daughter of Benjamin and Christiana HORNER of the Brighouse Meeting, Leeds, and had married firstly Nathaniel ENGLISH, a Quaker merchant of Leeds, by whom she had several children prior to his death in 1784.

Although not married until the day before his 42nd birthday, the eminent Quaker preacher, William, soon became the father of three children (William, 1745; Benjamin, 1748; Christiana, 1750) – the latter of whom died in infancy. Before his sons reached their majority, William died on 26th January 1763 at Sheepscar and was buried on 30th January at Meadow Lane, Leeds, where Anna was buried after her death on 30th April of the following year.

Realising her infirmity, Anna had made a will on 26th July, 1763, providing for the disposition of her wearing apparel, furniture, silver plate and linen, and the maintenance, education and support of her two sons, William and Benjamin.

As mentioned on page 3 of "The Family History of Hiram LONGMIRE 1814 – 1880:, Adelaide, 1972, <u>Benjamin LONGMIRE</u>, tobacconist, of Castle Donington, Leics. married Elizabeth PAGE of Derby, in 1772. Through their son, <u>William LONGMIRE</u> 1772-1848 they became the grandparents of Hiram LONGMIRE 1814-1880. Benjamin LONGMIRE and Elizabeth his wife must have returned to Leeds for a while at least, as a daughter, Annas LONGMIRE, was born to them there on 15th Dec. 1774 and the fact entered in the Quaker records.

After seven years of searching for Benjamin's place of birth and the links leading back to the LONGMIRE ancestral haunts in the Lake District, the breakthrough came about in the following way:-

In December, 1978 I received a letter from Hugh Torens of the Dept. of Geology, Keele University, Staffordshire, England, seeking information about a John Bateman LONGMIRE, a geologist from the Lake District who flourished in the first half of the 19th C. In connection with his research Hugh had contacted the Society of Genealogists, London, to whom I had given a copy of the LONGMIRE book and they sent him a photocopy of page 3. From my accumulated records, I was able to send Hugh the information that John Bateman LONGMIRE was baptised at Troutbeck, Westmorland on 13th July, 1785, the son of James and Elizabeth LONGMIRE.

On 22nd May, 1979 I received a letter from Hugh, thanking me for may help and enclosing a photocopy of a letter he'd received from the Library of the Religious Society of Friends, Friends House, Euston Road, London, N.W.1:-

"..... None of our indexes turn up J.B. Longmire of Whitehaven: the nearest I can get at it in that area (roughly) is that there were Quaker Longmires at Kendal and Crook, Westmorland, in the late 17th and into the mid-18th centuries; and one branch of this family, represented by William Longmire (d. 1763) moved to Shipscar near Leeds, Yorkshire. William Longmire had at least one son, Benjamin, who was producing children (including a Christiana) in the 1770's; Benjamin was a tobacconist in Leeds, and appears to have been disowned by Friends but to have been re-instated.

Malcolm Thomas."

Upon receipt of this marvellous news I immediately contacted Derek and Judith Longmire, then of Norfolk, but now of Greyhound House, Sedbergh Rd, Kendal, Westmorland LA9 6PF, and asked Judith to visit the Friends' Library to search their records. She replied that by coincidence, as she has been systematically collecting LONGMIRE wills for the LONGMIRE Archives she is establishing, she was on the brink of ordering Anna's will, which would have given the breakthrough independent of Hugh Torrens and Malcolm Thomas! She has now sent me this report and a copy of Anna's will.

I'd never previously thought of the family being Quakers. Now, however, I believe it could be possible that the second name of "Fox" assumed by Elizabeth STUART (nee LONGMIRE) 1844-1907 (page 32, LONGMIRE book) could have been an allusion to her forebear's association with the Quakers, founded by George Fox (1624-1691).
